Celebrate our South African seas and the 20th year of the new South Africa

It is time to take a stand to protect our coast and save our sea life. We don't have any time left to take our natural resources for granted. As well-known marine ecologist and conservationist Sylvia Earle said, "This is the most important decade in human history and arguably the most important in the next 10 000 years". Without action we will lose those critically endangered animals and plants we hear about on the news.

Did you know we only have three percent of the Western Cape crayfish left? The good news is that we have the three percent left as stock to grow if we take action now and do no further harm. The crayfish is one of many South African marine life creatures that are under as much threat as the rhino. Similarly, we have only two percent of many tuna, of some sharks and many other big fish left.

<u>Sustainable Seas Trust</u> (SST) encourages you to click your shutter in support of South Africa's marine resources and enter the nationwide photographic competition.

The photographic competition is one of many initiatives through which SST seeks to invite support for the identification and development of Hope Spots along our coastline.

Hope Spots, a phrase coined by, SST's international patron, Dr Sylvia Earle, are "pristine places in the sea that, if protected, can serve as sources of renewal for depleted species and systems, while contributing to overall planetary stability and health". The renowned oceanographer and National Geographic Explorer-in-Residence added that even traumatized areas can with care "be restored to a better condition - a cause for hope". "One of the best ways to encourage people to think about the environment, celebrate the beauty of South Africa and become part of the conservation movement is to involve them in taking action," SST's founding trustee and director, Dr Tony Ribbink said, adding that conservation and sustainability depend on people choosing to behave in ways that care for the environment.

"The action of picking up a camera and thinking about the environment being photographed is one small step in the right direction. If many people take this small step, then the overall cumulative commitment has the potential to become a powerful movement, especially if the youth of today is involved," Dr Ribbink said.

While the competition encourages an understanding that leads to people opting to commit to more sustainable lifestyles, another objective is to develop support for SST's education and skills training programmes which benefit impoverished coastal communities.

The SST Photo Competition is open to all photographers with prizes for the best photographs from the three categories of youth, hobbyists, and professional photographers and seeks "to encourage the public to get out and about on our country's coastlines in order to capture what they believe makes our coastlines some of the best in the world and more importantly what we should be striving to preserve". The five photographic sections are: Scenery; Recreation and Sport; Culture and History; and Marine Life.

"A further step is for the public to evaluate the photographs and vote for those which they think are excellent and deserve to be published and win awards. Once again, people need to think about the environment and the messages related to conservation and sustainability." Dr Ribbink said. All photo entries are available for viewing and liking on the SEA Pledge Facebook page in the 2013 Photo Competition album.

The photographs selected by the public and professional judges will be published in a book to celebrate 20 years of the New South Africa with a focus on the *Splendours of South African Seas* as one aspect of our national heritage. Winning photographs are eligible for a variety of sponsored prizes offered by SST and Hanli Prinsloo, Fiona Ayerst, Peter van Kets, Eleanor Yeld Hutchings, Dalfrenzo Laing and Peter Chadwick.
